A Message from the City Manager

Knowing who to contact at the City can be tricky and sometimes daunting because of the wide variety of services that the City provides. The following information will help you know the quickest and most efficient ways to make a request or have a concern answered. Please continue reading!

If I need assistance from the City, should I visit with the Mayor, a Council Member, a City Employee, or the City Manager?

To understand who can help you, it's important to understand each of their roles.



City Council oversees City ordinances, policies, goal/vision/mis-sion setting, adopting a balanced budget, changing laws, high-level governance of the City and they are the ultimate authority who make decisions on behalf of residents. The City Council are elected representatives who are accountable to the community for their decisions. The City Manager, City Attorney, and Municipal Judge are the only City employees who report directly to Council. Feel free to reach out to your City Council at any time with suggestions and concerns regarding the City but understand that they will work with the appropriate people and departments regarding your feedback.

The **Mayor** is a voting member of the City Council who is selected by the Council every two years. The Mayor presides at council meetings, represents the City in intergovernmental relationships, appoints members of citizen advisory boards and commissions, assigns agenda items to committees, facilitates communication and understanding between elected and appointed officials, and assists the Council in setting goals and advocating policy decisions.

The **City Manager** works with the Mayor, City Council, City Staff, residents, businesses, and community partners to accomplish the mission, vision, directives, and initiatives of the City Council. The City Manager oversees operations, including but not limited to, collaborating with department heads and staff, preparing and submitting a balanced budget, facilitating strategic planning, etc.

City Staff run operations and implement the decisions of the City Council. Staff also helps the City Council by submitting policy proposals, providing them with facts, giving technical/professional advice about policy options, collaborating with them in setting goals for the community, and enforcement of ordinances.

If I have a concern or request, what are my options for sharing it?

- **Phone, Email, or In-Person:** You are welcome to contact any City Council member, the City Manager, or Department Head. You can find contact info for City Council at rawlinswy.gov/council. You can find contact info for city staff at rawlinswy.gov/staff. You can also call 307-328-4500 for assistance finding the correct number or email.

- **Online:** The City has a website tool called "Report a Concern/Request". Visit rawlinswy.gov/concern, or you can find the tool at the bottom of the City's webpage. You will be prompted to submit your request/concern to the appropriate department. Each item that is submitted will go to the appropriate Department Head AND the City Manager. When an item is submitted, an email is sent out and the Department Head will begin working on your request/concern. Once the request/concern is complete, an email will be sent back to you with information on how the issue was resolved. If a request/concern cannot be resolved or will take additional time, we will respond back to you and let you know the status of your request/concern.



We prefer to receive requests/concerns using this system so we can better track the types and frequency of issues throughout the community. This in turn helps us make more informed decisions on how we can best serve you. Using this system also ensures that your request/concern is not overlooked.

For requests/concerns not covered by the tool for the Police Department, Fire Department, and Animal Control, or if it is the weekend/evening and you experience a water break or sewage backup, call emergency dispatch at 307-328-4530.

In an emergency, always call or text 911.

What if I need help with submitting a request/concern using this tool?

Should I reach out on social media to get my request/concern answered?

We prefer residents contact us directly via "Report A Concern/Request", by phone, email or an in-person visit to resolve their concerns. This makes sure that city staff is aware of the issue and can communicate effectively about the status of the request/concern. Voicing concerns on social media typically causes contention and division amongst all those involved and detracts from building a united community. An unintentional consequence of addressing concerns about the City on social media is that it can often affect the morale of employees, which in turn can lower the quality of service you receive. We have amazing employees who love serving our amazing community members. The more respect that employees receive, the better service you will get. **Instant Karma!**

I hope this information has been helpful and that you feel comfortable reaching out to us anytime you need assistance. It is our goal to provide you with the highest quality service possible.





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Sidewalks, Intersections, and Parking – Oh My!

As the City Council and Staff have focused on improving safety and beautification, including education on parking laws, the Rawlins Police Department has been notified of more parking issues throughout our community. This summer our officers have started a focused and ongoing effort to educate citizens on our parking ordinances, and work with them to fix the violation before any citations are given.

We began with direct mailings in the Utility Bill, the City View magazine, website news updates, and social media releases explaining our parking ordinances to our community. When violations are observed, we will continue to attempt to contact residents and educate one-on-one then provide reasonable time to remedy the issue.







Some of our common violations include:

- Parking on or blocking a sidewalk, even in own driveway (Diagrams 1 and 2)
- Parking too close to an intersection
 - Must be 20' from any intersection with no traffic control device in the direction of travel (Diagram 3)
 - Must be 30' from an intersection with a traffic control device, such as stop sign, in the direction of travel (Diagram 4)
 - Large vehicles (more than 6' tall for more than 6' in length) must be 40' from any intersection (Diagram 5)
- Parking on the wrong side of the road with the vehicle parked facing traffic (Diagram 6)
- Parking of commercial trailers on City streets

Our officers are committed to educating the citizens on the various ordinances and will work with first-time violators so the codes can be understood. After education efforts have taken place, officers will take appropriate enforcement actions beginning with warnings.

Our officer's primary concern is the safety of our citizens, keeping sidewalks open to pedestrians and cyclists, and helping citizens comply with City and State parking regulations. Officers will attempt to contact citizens with a phone call or at their home when a violation is observed. If we are unable to make contact, the officer will leave a notice of the violation on the vehicle.

Learn About Water Treatment in Your PJs



Our third stop on the tour is the filter bay where the four filters are located, as well as all the necessary piping and pumps. The tour explains our filter media and how it is delivered to the filter. Flows and filter media may be observed through a sight glass on each filter, as well as a 4-foot section of wood stave pipeline. From this room the chlorine disinfection may be observed through a plate glass safety window showing the scales and cylinders used.

The tour next visits the filter media mixing tank room where the filter media can be observed in clear plastic tanks, along with the piping and pumps to take the media to the filters. We then visit the clear well (filtered water storage tank) room and view the instrumentation used to check our turbidity (murkiness) levels, chlorine levels, and chlorine dosage controls for the finished water leaving the treatment plant and entering the distribution system.

Have you ever wondered how our springs, well, and reservoir water is treated to provide it to Rawlins and Sinclair for drinking, bathing, fire protection and more? Your wait can end today! We have created an online video tour available at www.rawlinswy.gov/watertreatment or www.rawlinswy.gov.youtube. It is about (45) minutes long and covers everything an in-person tour includes, on your own schedule and in your pajamas. You can also schedule an in-person tour for individuals, families, or groups by calling 307-328-4564.

Next, the tour continues to the main hall where our reservoirs are discussed, including photos, map, and explanation of fill-up procedures of the reservoirs. We also view a map of where our springs, transmission line, and the nugget well lines are located and the flow from these various locations to the treatment plant is explained.

The tour begins by welcoming the attendees and introducing them to the staff. We then proceed to the control room where the SCADA system and the control panel are explained in detail. These are used to monitor and operate the plant.

Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape!



For Fire Prevention Week 2022 (October 9-15), the Rawlins Fire Department, in conjunction with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), are educating our community about the critical importance of developing a home escape plan with all members of the household and practicing it regularly.

In addition, this October represents the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week, the nation's longest-running public health observance on record. This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign capitalizes on its milestone anniversary, celebrating all we have accomplished to reduce public risk to fire over the past hundred years. At the same time, the theme, "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape," addresses challenges that remain.

According to NFPA data, home — the place people feel safest from fire — is where we are at greatest risk, with three-quarters of all U.S. fire deaths occurring in homes. When a home fire does occur, it's more likely to be serious; people are MORE likely to die in a home fire today than they were in 1980.

A contributing factor is that today's homes burn faster and hotter than they used to, reducing the amount of time they have to escape safely. In a typical home fire, people may have as little as two minutes (or even less) to get out from the time the smoke alarms alerts.

"Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape" promotes potentially life-saving messages that can mean the difference between life and death in a fire. Developing a home escape plan with all members of the household and practicing it regularly ensures that everyone knows what to do when the smoke alarm sounds and uses that time wisely.

To make sure your household is ready, pay attention to the "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape" key points:

- Make sure your home escape plan meets the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows open easily.
- Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home where everyone should meet.
- Practice your home fire drill at least twice a year with everyone in the household, including guests. Practice at least once during the day and at night.



- Built and set up target systems for handgun ranges
- Established monthly and annual handgun competitions
- Built an elevated archery stand
- Built a 5-stand shotgun range
- Devised a 1000-yard target system for long range rifle competitions (through NRA grant)



7 Tips to Keep Your Property in Compliance with Local Codes



1 Keep weeds and grasses trimmed

Weeds and grass are not permitted to grow higher than 8 inches. Rawlins Municipal Code § 8.16.020h


2 Properly dispose of "junk"

Junk, such as derelict/abandoned vehicles, metal, glass, weeds, lumber, grass, branches, construction debris, appliances, building material, salvage/scrap material, or other discarded materials not intended for immediate use are nuisances. See 8.16.020(i) for extensive information on derelict vehicles. Rawlins Municipal Code § 8.16.010 and 8.16.020(j)(i)

3 Follow trash container laws

- Lid must close on bin
 - All trash must be bagged in an appropriate bag
 - No bags, boxes, trash, etc. on the ground
- Rawlins Municipal Code § 8.8.160



Alleys are the responsibility of the property owner
City ordinances also apply to alleys, utility easements, and right-of-ways and must be maintained by the adjacent property owner Rawlins Municipal Code § 8.8.110.

5 Green waste must be removed

Tree limbs, branches, grass clippings, leaves and other green waste must be disposed of properly. Green waste can be disposed free at landfill. No garbage or refuse may be burned within the city. Rawlins Municipal Code § 8.8.130 & 8.8.180

6 Other things can also be nuisances

Actions or items that disturb the peace or are offensively stinky are also nuisances. Rawlins Municipal Code § 8.8.020

7 Keep in mind what can be discarded at no charge

Oil, metal, manure, green waste, limbs/branches, grass, and clean dirt may be disposed of at the landfill at no charge. Aluminum cans, cardboard, paperboard, clear plastics #1, colored plastics #2, milk jugs, clear and brown glass containers, clean steel cans, newspapers with inserts, office paper and magazines can be recycled.




